What is buffered antacid?

Antacids are often taken to relieve heartburn, acid indigestion and a "sour" or upset stomach. Symptoms antacids may be helpful for include: A burning feeling in your stomach or chest. This may be more noticeable after you've eaten, or at night, and is typically a result of stomach acid and/or undigested food rising into your esophagus.

Is famotidine a antacid?

No. Famotidine is a medicine known as an H₂ blocker, which decreases the amount of acid being produced in the stomach. Famotidine can be bought over the counter to prevent heartburn or acid indigestion, but it works differently to an antacid, which works to neutralize existing stomach acid. It's also the active ingredient in PEPCID®.

Are antacids acidic?

Antacids are bases-- the chemical opposite of an acid. When you add a base to liquid containing acids, such as stomach juices, the fluid becomes less acidic. In this way, antacids can prevent the stomach contents from getting too acidic, and reduce the chances that the acid will travel up into the esophagus.
