

Is electric vehicle charging free?

Electric vehicle charging is not free, but some stations and programs let you top up at no cost. Here's how to save some cash when powering up your EV. With US gas prices topping \$5 per gallon, the option to charge up for free is a satisfying perk of owning an electric vehicle.

Where can I find a free EV charger?

The best and easiest way to find a free EV charger is the same way you'd find any other public charging point. In the words of Jobs-era Apple, there's an app for that. There are countless apps out there designed to help you locate and navigate to EV charging stations.

Are EV charging stations free?

So yeah, sure, it's free to plug in and charge there--just expect to spend several hours in the parking lot while your EV juices up. (In other words, you may want to make sure what type of charging is available before you commit.) But that's not to say that free Level 2 charging stations don't exist either.

How much does it cost to charge an EV?

Per the DOE's website: "If electricity costs \$0.13 per kilowatt-hour, charging an EV with a 200-mile range (assuming a fully depleted 66 kWh battery) will cost about \$9 to reach a full charge." And while it uses different vehicle and electricity cost benchmarks, that's in the ballpark of what the California Air Resource Board (CARB) says too:

How much does it cost to charge an electric car?

At this price, charging an electric car such as the Nissan LEAF with a 40-kWh battery with a 150-mile range would cost about \$7 to fully charge." And when it comes to using one of California's publicly available EV charging stations alluded to above, CARB gives some estimates there as well:

Which EV models come with free charging?

Edmunds has a full list of all EV models that come with free charging. A few examples: Volkswagen ID.4: Comes with 30 minutes of free level 3/DC fast charging, and 60 minutes of level 2 charging at Electrify America stations. Ford F150 Lightning: Comes with 250 kWh of power at level 3/DC fast charging at Electrify America stations.
