

Can you bring a power bank on a plane?

You can bring a typical personal power bank, up to 100 watt hours. However, multiple airlines have now introduced new rules regarding them. That's because a fire erupted on a plane caused by one of the portable lithium batteries. Korean airline Air Busan's plane was wrecked on January 28, 2025 when it caught fire on the runway. Nobody was hurt.

Can you take solar panels on a plane?

Solar panels can be brought on a plane as carry-on or checked luggage, but the batteries must be in carry-on luggage and should not exceed 100 watt-hours. Can you bring a battery on a plane?

According to the International Air Transport Association (IATA), the global aviation body, passengers can bring portable batteries and spare lithium-ion batteries under certain guidelines: Power banks with a capacity of up to 100 watt-hours (Wh), roughly 27,000 milliampere-hours (mAh), are allowed in carry-on baggage only.

Can I bring a 20000 mAh power bank on a plane?

Yes, you can bring a 20000mAh power bank on a plane, but it must be packed in a carry-on bag and you will need airline approval if it is over 100Wh. Our favorite power banks that are within the FAA and airline guidelines are the RAVPower 22000mAh Portable Charger and the Anker PowerCore 10000.

Lithium-ion batteries, such as power banks, should only be packed in carry-on baggage, according to US FAA and Transportation Security Administration (TSA) rules. In general, most airlines allow each passenger to carry a maximum of two lithium-ion power banks of 100-160 Watt-hour (Wh) into the cabin.
