Do you have to pay to charge an electric car?

You have to pay to charge your electric car at most charging stations. Owners typically charge electric vehicles at home, where energy costs less than "filling up" at commercial charging stations. Free charging stations are available at some shopping centers, providing slower Level 2 chargers to customers.

How do I pay for an electric car?

You can pay at a charging station using a charging card, a mobile app, or directly with a credit/debit card. Some stations also support Plug & Charge or Autocharge, where payment is automatic once you plug in your car. The list below outlines the key payment options you have as an electric car driver.

Living with an electric car is easy. Most people do the majority of their charging at home. However, if you have to visit a public charging station, there are a few key details that will help make the experience hassle-free.

How do I charge my electric car?

If you have an at-home setup, you'll pay to charge your electric car through your monthly electric bill. If you're paying at a public charging station, you can use that network's app or pay as you go by simply swiping your credit or debit card and paying the specified rate.

How much does it cost to charge a car?

It can be around 1 euro. Charging time is measured from the moment the vehicle is plugged into the station, and the billing typically concludes when you disconnect the charging cable or cease charging through the app, not necessarily when the battery is fully charged.
