

How do you transplant from Solo cups?

Transplanting from solo cups. Easy way. Transplanting from solo cups. Easy way. I start by cutting along the edge of the bottom. Maybe 3 or 4 around the bottom, then a triangle pointing up from the center of that slit with the top point pointing to the rim.

How do you cut a Solo cup?

To cut a Solo cup, warm a screwdriver over an open flame for about a minute and then push down with some force to melt through the cup. This method provides the smoothest process and the least chance of cracking the cup. You can also use other tools like scissors or a box knife, but melting with a heated screwdriver is recommended.

Do you make drainage holes in a solo Cup?

If not I will make drainage holes in solo cup. Thank you for your advice! I suggest transplanting right away. They have been struggling in those solo cups. In general the rule of thumb is transplant when leaves extend over the edges of the cup, but your leaves are small and plants are way past due.

Can red Solo cups be used for hydroponics?

That way I can see when the roots start getting to the container walls. @merlin44, I read an article a few years ago that suggested if you use a clear cup inside a colored cup you should make sure to darken the rim around the top of the clear cup with either a non-toxic marker or black tape.
